Great to generate after doing the discharge medication reconcilliation to send to a pharmacy, in order to clarify medications which were stopped or changed.



FIND WHAT YOU SEEK

Finding the right document, test, or order in Cerner seems to be the #1 ongoing issue for users. Here are few tips to narrow down the vast amount of information and number of options contained in the system so you can find what you are looking for without wanting to pull your hair out.

FINDING DOCUMENTS

When you are looking for a specific document, particularly one NOT written by a physician, it can be easy to get lost in a sea of 'Medication Administration Followup' notes. There is a default filter for 'Only physician notes' but it's also easy to create your own custom filter, or just filter for a specific note type on an ad hoc basis. See below for an example for finding notes from IPAC staff when you want to check if a patient has been cleared from a COVID perspective:



FINDING ORDERS

I've said it before, I'll say it again, and I will keep saying it . . . don't drive yourself bonkers using the 'Orders' search for your routine, day to day ordering! There's just too many options on the dropdown search and you're way more likely to accidentally order that bloodwork as an outpatient order, or that ceftriaxone as IM injection by mistake. Plus, at least in my opinion, clicking >> typing – and with the Quick Orders I can place 80-90% of my orders without ever using a keyboard.

It's worth taking some time to get to know your Quick Orders tab and when there's something you can't find on there, simply add it as a favourite once you've found it on the search – and never have to search for it again!
